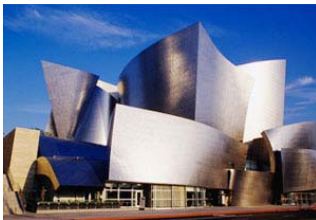

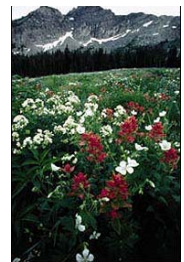

Different by Nature

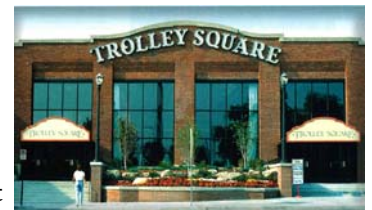
